

London Mathematical Society Women and Non-Binary People in Mathematics Days

Guidelines for Prospective Organisers

The LMS Committee for Women and Diversity in Mathematics supports two Women and Non-Binary People in Mathematics events each academic year in the UK, with up to £1,000 available for each event.

Guidelines for events are as follows:

- 1. At least one member of the organising committee should be an LMS member.
- 2. To provide continuity and support, a member of the Women and Diversity in Mathematics Committee will be appointed to advise the organising committee of each event.
- 3. The event will be advertised through various LMS outlets. It may also be advertised in other ways, but must include a mention of LMS support and use LMS branding.
- 4. The event should be focused around women, including trans women, and non-binary people in mathematics. However, all people should be welcome and encouraged to attend.
- 5. The event should be focused around postgraduate level upwards, but should be open to undergraduates.
- 6. All speakers at the event, whether invited or selected from submitted proposals, must be women (including trans women) or non-binary people. If there is a panel, members may be of any gender, but an explanation should be given for why any chosen cis male panellists are appropriate.
- 7. There must be some opportunity for early career women/non-binary mathematicians to share their work. If this is only done through a poster session, the submitted posters may only be by women/non-binary people.
- 8. Organisers are encouraged to include women/non-binary speakers from industry. Such speakers may be eligible for additional IMA support if they are advertised as IMA speakers.
- 9. No more than a £5 registration fee may be levelled to participants.
- 10. Some portion of the award must be used to support travel of participants (not including speakers and organisers) who are students or LMS members.
- 11. If an event focusing on a particular mathematical area is proposed, organisers should include an explanation of why this will be of interest to a large number of participants, and how they will ensure a large proportion of women and non-binary participants.
- 12. Talks should be accessible to participants at the range of levels to which the event is open.
- 13. After the event, a report should be written for the LMS Newsletter.

Proposals will be selected for funding based on the following principles:

- 1. Ensuring the event supports and promotes women (including trans women) and non-binary people in mathematics.
- 2. Reaching participants with a diverse set of interests.
- 3. Maintaining geographic diversity in location.
- 4. Ensuring the event is, as much as possible, environmentally sustainable. See the <u>LMS Environmental</u> Policy Statement for reference.
- 5. Ensuring each event is well organised and well attended.
